GETTING STARTED WITH LANGUAGE STUDY

WORLD LANGUAGE PATHWAYS

Students can follow one of three pathways to complete the World Language General Education Requirement for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences

Fourth Level Proficiency

Third Level + Cultural Exploration Course

Second Level of Two Languages

Complete four levels of a world language through high school, college coursework, or proficiency testing.

Complete three levels of language in high school or college, plus an approved World Language and Cultural Exploration course.

Complete 2nd level coursework in 2 different languages, equivalent to 2 years in HSl or 2 semesters in college for each.

WORLD LANGUAGE PLACEMENT TESTING

Who Should Take Placement Test?

- If you completed 4 years of a language, no test is needed, unless you want to continue studying that language.
- If you completed fewer than 4 years, check with your advisor to determine how to meet the Gen Ed requirement.
- If you plan to continue studying your HS language, take the test to be placed in the right course.

When Should You Take the Placement Test?

At least 2 weeks prior to your orientation session.

Where? How?

• Multiple-choice, adaptive online test covering grammar, reading, and vocabulary. No external resources are allowed. It takes about an hour.

Scoring

- Your score appears at the end—save or print a copy. The test results will help you and your advisor determine the best level for your first enrollment in a language course.
- Each program has different recommendations for placement scores.



The Furthering Language Incentive Program (FLIP) allows students who've met the CLAS General Education World Languages requirement to earn up to 8 additional credits while studying a language.

<u>UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS</u>
