
Spanish is not a foreign language. It is the second most spoken language in Iowa - more than 130,000 Iowa residents speak Spanish at home!

The Portuguese language and Lusophone cultures are crucial to Iowa and the United States. 25,520 Portuguese speakers live in the Midwest and 692,500 in the United States.

SPANISH PLACEMENT TESTING

Who Should Take Placement Test?

- If you completed 4 years of Spanish, no test needed, unless you want to continue.
- If you completed fewer than 4 years, check with your advisor to determine Gen Ed requirement.
- If you plan to continue studying Spanish, take the test to be placed in the right course.

When Should You Take the Placement Test?

• At least 2 weeks prior to your orientation session. Where? How?

• Multiple-choice, adaptive online test covering grammar, reading, and vocabulary.No external resources are allowed. It takes about an hour.

Scoring

- Your score appears at the end—save or print a copy. The test results will help you and your advisor determine the best level for your first enrollment in a language course.

Studens in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences benefit from approximately \$1 million in annual student scholarships thanks to generous alumni and donors who support and value our mission, making a liberal arts education more financially accessible to students.

Explore the Iowa Scholarship Portal for Opportunities Like These:

- Oscar Fernández Scholarship: Up to \$1,300 for juniors or seniors in CLAS majoring in Spanish or Portuguese. Requires financial need (FAFSA or award letter) and academic excellence. Self-nominations and faculty nominations accepted.
- Spanish Student Aid Scholarship: \$500 for a Spanish major demonstrating financial need and merit.
- Genevieve Davis Searle Scholarship: Up to \$10,000 for two semesters abroad in a Spanish-speaking country.

Students of Spanish and Portuguese should investigate the Esther Walls Scholarship Fund, the James and Syndy Conger Scholarship Fund, They are also eligible for the Boren Award, which can be used for Study Abroad.

International Programs has many funding opportunities.

- Students majoring in a world language who are participating in a study abroad program or an international internship program through International Programs should investigate the Richard J. Tyner International Programs Scholarship.
- Undergraduate students who study abroad in countries including sub-Saharan Africa, Asia (including Central Asia), Latin America, and the Middle East (including North Africa) should investigate the Joel D. and Sandra Barkan Scholarship.
- Undergraduate students who are committed to developing advanced language proficiency should investigate the Naomi Gunderson Scholarship for Foreign Language Study Abroad.
- Undergraduate students who have completed at least one year of Spanish or Portuguese and are looking to study abroad in Spain and Latin America can look into the Carol A. Snodgrass Scholarship.
- The Global Access Ambassador Scholarship program provides awards to study abroad for a summer, winter, semester, or academic year program. The scholarships are intended to support students who study abroad with the intent to serve as Global Access Ambassadors upon return to the UI campus. 5

Spanish Major Requirements

- 1. Foundations course (4 years of High School Spanish can count for this requirement!)

Analytical Skills

- Acquired the skills to engage critically with one or more of the following areas.
 - Spanish, Spanish American, and U.S. Latino literatures and cultures
 - Hispanic linguistics
 - Creative and/or journalistic writing
 - Spanish for the professions (e.g., health and business)
 - Translation

Intercultural Knowledge

 Gained intercultural knowledge of the diversity of the Hispanic world (Spain/Portugal, Latin America, and the United States) and its cultural, artistic, and linguistic history.

At Iowa, you'll:

- Explore the cultures of Brazil, Portugal, and Lusophone Africa while strengthening communication skills.
- Practice at Bate-Papo conversation hour or with peer tutors.
- Join cultural events like Carnaval, movie nights, cooking classes, yoga, and readings with IWP writers.
- Study abroad in Lisbon for full immersion.
- Use your Spanish skills to learn Portuguese even faster.
- Connect with local companies like John Deere that have major operations in Brazil.
- Engage with one of the most spoken languages among students and families in Iowa City.

SPANISH FOR HEALTH CARE

SPAN:1502: Intermediate Spanish for Health Care Providers

This course is tailored for aspiring healthcare professionals—from doctors to paraprofessionals. Using Maletín Médico, a free, open educational textbook, it focuses on building medical vocabulary, mastering complex grammatical concepts, and developing strategies to navigate cultural differences in healthcare settings—all taught in Spanish





SPAN:2090 – Medical Spanish in Contemporary Society

This intensive, communicative course further develops your medical Spanish skills, emphasizing vocabulary, health-related cultural competence, and discussions on issues affecting Hispanic communities in the U.S. and abroad. It's ideal for students in fields such as Nursing, Premed, Biomedical Engineering, and Global Health Studies.

SPAN:3903

Introduction to Medical Spanish-English Interpretation Designed for students in healthcare, this introductory course covers the history, techniques, and ethical standards of medical interpreting. Through role plays and practical exercises, students learn to work with professional interpreters and gain the skills necessary to support limited English proficiency patients—an essential asset in today's healthcare landscape.

CERTIFICATE IN LATIN AMERICAN STUDIES

The Latin American Studies Program is an interdisciplinary curriculum that introduces students to cultures, arts, languages, histories, and social practices from Mexico, Central and South America, and the Caribbean, and provides students with frameworks for making sense of the social, political, and economic challenges faced in those regions.



Faculty members from across the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences participate in the Latin American Studies Program as affiliated faculty members. Other University of Iowa faculty members occasionally offer courses and participate in the program's research, study, and interdisciplinary activities




